⁴³The next day Jesus decided to leave for Galilee. Finding Philip, he said to him, "Follow me."

¹Then I saw in the right hand of him who sat on the throne a scroll with writing on both sides and sealed with seven seals. ²And I saw a mighty angel proclaiming in a loud voice, "Who is worthy to break the seals and open the scroll?" ³But no one in heaven or on earth or under the earth could open the scroll or even look inside it. ⁴I wept and wept because no one was found who was worthy to open the scroll or look inside. ⁵Then one of the elders said to me, "Do not weep! See, the Lion of the tribe of Judah, the Root of David, has triumphed. He is able to open the scroll and its seven seals."

⁶Then I saw a Lamb, looking as if it had been slain, standing in the centre of the throne, encircled by the four living creatures and the elders. He had seven horns and seven eyes, which are the seven spirits of God sent out into all the earth. ⁷He came and took the scroll from the right hand of him who sat on the throne. ⁸And when he had taken it, the four living creatures and the twenty-four elders fell down before the Lamb. ¹⁰You have made them to be a kingdom and priests to serve our God, and they will reign on the earth."

<u>Sermon – Rachel</u>

Who do you say I am? Matthew, Mark and Luke all record Jesus asking his disciples this question. If only they could have borrowed the Tardis they could have jumped forward 60 years or so, taken a peek at John 1 and Revelation 5 and found an embarrassment of answers: Word, Light of mankind, Lord, one and only Son, Lamb of God, Rabbi, God's Chosen One, Messiah, Lion of Judah, Root of David, Son of God, King of Israel, Son of Man.

Epiphany is a season of revelation and these names for Jesus reveal so much about him –his divine nature and his presence from the beginning to the end of time, his death and its foreshadowing in the Old Testament, his fulfilment of prophecy, his role as Saviour and his triumphant reign as king. But *we* have the benefit of the gospel accounts of his life and 2000 years of scholars from St Paul to Tom Wright to help us draw out the meaning of these titles. Looking at our gospel reading, I wonder what Nathanael means when he declares Jesus to be Son of God and king of Israel, and what it is about their brief encounter that reveals this to him?

We first meet Nathanael sitting under a fig tree, a popular spot to shelter from the sun and study the scriptures. Perhaps that's just what he's doing when his friend Philip charges in – "We have found the one Moses and the prophets wrote about". Maybe Philip knows that this appeal to scripture is the way to capture his friend's attention. But then he almost ruins things with his next words – "Jesus of Nazareth". You see, Nathanael comes from Cana, just a few miles from Nazareth. It's as if Philip had told a Yorkshireman "we've found the new king – and he's from Lancaster!" or told an Arsenal fan "we've found the best footballer in the world – she's down at White Hart Lane". Local rivalries existed 2000 years ago just as they do now. What good thing could possibly come from Nazareth?

Philip doesn't stop to explain which prophecies and scriptures he has in mind. He simply says, "come and see". Because you can describe someone all you want but nothing beats meeting them for yourself. And Nathanael the scholar, Nathanael the sceptic, Nathanael the curious comes. Because what if? What if this Jesus really is the one they've been waiting for? Surely it's worth a look. So he goes with Philip to meet Jesus. And in just a few moments his scepticism is blasted out of the water. Jesus clearly has supernatural knowledge of Nathanael, but I wonder if there's also just something about Jesus, something about being in his presence that shows Nathanael this is someone special: "Son of God; king of Israel." Which brings us back to my question earlier – what does Nathanael mean by this declaration?

Well, probably not the same as us. In Nathaniel's day the title Son of God doesn't mean the bearer is divine, it simply means they have a special relationship with God or they've been chosen by God for a special purpose or mission. King of Israel suggests that this chosen one is expected to lead Israel in a new golden age, like she enjoyed under David and Solomon. So Nathanael's not declaring he believes Jesus to be God but it's still a hugely significant thing for him to say. Israel has been waiting hundreds of years for God to send his chosen one to free Israel from foreign oppression and restore her to her former glory. Nathanael's spent a lifetime longing for

the Messiah to come. Son of God, king of Israel – these aren't just honorary titles, in the way that Prince Charles is designated Knight of the Garter and Earl of Chester. These are titles that speak into Nathanael's deepest hopes and dreams as a faithful Israelite. These are names that have real, practical meaning for his life. When Nathanael meets Jesus he sees someone who could change everything.

Of course, Nathanael doesn't yet understand what Jesus is going to do but Jesus gives him an enigmatic hint: "Very truly I tell you, you will see heaven open, and the angels of God ascending and descending on the Son of Man." Let's unpack that a bit. Son of Man is a title found in the book of Daniel. Once he's finished with lions and furnaces, Daniel has a vision in which he sees one like a son of man coming with the clouds of heaven, and this son of man is given an everlasting kingdom. He's worshipped by people from all nations. You might notice some similarities with our 2nd reading from Revelation 5. John has a vision of the Lamb who has purchased people from all nations with his blood and is worshiped by heavenly beings. So Son of Man is a name Jesus often uses for himself that points to his coming reign as king of all nations. Jesus' words also look back to another well-known vision recorded in Genesis 28; Jacob has a dream where he sees the angels of God going up and down a ladder stretching between earth and heaven. But here Jesus declares himself to be the ladder joining earth to Heaven. Jesus will open the way between mankind and God. We hope for so many things, just like Nathanael tangible thing like good friends, homes, jobs, health, an end to this pandemic, the restoration of normal life. But Jesus, Son of Man, promises something far greater – he promises to restore the relationship between us and God, he promises all the riches Jonathan and Sam have been exploring over the last couple of weeks, that flow from that restored relationship, and he promises us a new home in his everlasting kingdom.

Who are you in this story? Are you Philip, bursting to share good news with your friend, inviting them to come and see? Are you Nathanael under the fig tree, searching, hoping but sceptical that Jesus can offer you what you need? Perhaps looking in the wrong places? Are you an onlooker watching from across the hillside, wondering where these two friends are hurrying off to? Will you forget about them under the weight of your own hopes and fears? Or will curiosity pull you after them to come and see, to discover more of who Jesus is each day you spend with him? Will you let go of your hopes and dreams to take hold of the promises of Jesus? It was worth it for Philip and Nathanael. It will be worth it for us too.
