Sermon – Rev Sam Waako –

Tom wright tells a story of a historian who was in a hurry to finish his PHD. There was one chapter left to go that concerned a painting that had been so important during his time, and the influence the artist had had on the wider thought and culture of the time.

And so the historian went on hastily from gallery to gallery, with his notebook in hand scribbling down all the details from printed notices underneath the paintings. He wrote down the artists' names, their dates, where they lived, names of their key paintings, who their friends were, what influences others had on them, and so on and so forth. As soon as he finished one gallery, he went to another and another and so on.

Tom Wright goes on to say, "He finished his PHD. But at no time, in all the art galleries, had he ever stood back and looked at the paintings themselves, and allowed them to speak in their own language. The printed notes underneath the paintings from which he was making his notes, were only there to lead the eye, the mind and the heart to appreciate the paintings. Sadly, this was missed by the historian".

And in our gospel reading this morning, just like in the story of the historian, we encounter a crowd who had been a part of one of Jesus' miracles prior to this, but had sadly fixated on the product of the miracle and had completely missed to look up on the person of the miracle.

A bit of background to this gospel text, is that at the beginning of chapter 6 of John's gospel, we are told of Jesus' feeding the 5000 to their fill, to the extent that 12 baskets were left over....but then we are told that the next day, this same crowd, went looking for Jesus, not because of who He was and what He had done, but because of what He could do for them...and in this case, getting their hands on more of this bread.

This upset Jesus and hence the rebuke, criticizing the crowd who followed Him only for the physical and temporal benefits and not for the satisfying of their spiritual hunger. The crowd were seeking Jesus for His usefulness; usefulness to provide bread. And in our context, usefulness to provide for our needs; money, health, prosperity and so on. Sometimes we can be caught in that trap to seek Jesus only for His usefulness to provide for 'our stuff'! The crowd, and I am sure many of us at times, have made the mistake of not allowing our eyes run up the beam of His usefulness to the real treasure, the real bread of life, Jesus Christ the Son of God.

The miracle of the feeding of the 5000+ with the bread and fish, among other miracles that Jesus had performed, should have been a sign to lead the eyes, the minds, the hearts of the crowd to the true gift of God to His people, the one who had come down like manna to the Israelites from Heaven, the true food, the true bread of life, and that is Jesus Himself. What matters is not what Jesus can do for you, but rather, it's who Jesus is.

And so Jesus points the crowd, and points us, to what true spiritual nourishment is and where it comes from. In John 6.35 Jesus declares, *"I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never go hungry, whoever believes in me will never be thirsty."* Jesus shows us that He is the true bread. He is to the soul, what bread is to the body, nourishes and supports the spiritual life.

In the online service, a few people have shared three things that they would find nourishing if they were to find themselves on a desert Island. And in relation to that, I want to share three things that will help us maintain a healthy level of spiritual nutrition and will 'keep us going' in our walk with Christ Jesus.

1) A regular diet of God's word; Just as we all must eat every day, so must we take the time to read scripture each day. Deut 8.3 says, "...then He fed you with manna,

something neither you nor your parents knew anything about, so you would learn that men and women don't live by bread only; we live by every word that comes from God's mouth." Our souls must be nourished on the truth of the faith and of good sound teaching that you have followed, Paul tells Timothy. Even five mins each day in scripture is enough, plenty of devotionals out there to help, my favourite is the Bible app which has thousands of devotionals. And if you struggle to read scripture on your own, do take advantage of opportunities like morning prayer where we read the bible and seek God through scripture.

- 2) **Pray regularly;** In reading the Bible, God speaks to us, in praying, we speak to God. I have found prayer does many things, among them, Psalm 55.22 says "Cast your cares (burdens) on the Lord and He will sustain you; He will never let you be shaken." Last week we were looking at how God directs us, as well as keeping us spiritually topped up, prayer aligns our lives to the Lord's timing and direction. Mark Lemprerie last week in Notes and News shared with us an app called Lectio 365 that is great for helping us to pray, do check it out if you own an Apple or an Android gadget.
- 3) **Silence and meditation;** After we have read the Bible and Prayed, it's always important to 'stand back' and take time to be still and listen on the things of God. Someone once said, "God has a habit of speaking to us in the silence of our hearts, where He resides." We need to do what the historian never did, stand back and immerse ourselves in God's artistry and allow it to speak to us. The only way it can is if we make time to be silent and meditate on it.

The crowd failed to recognise who Jesus really was, and sometimes we make the same mistake, if we eat the bread (which represents not just food in general but also all other earthly things) but fail to recognise who Jesus is. There will always be that deep hunger inside us that will never be satisfied. And if we are in that place, as well as believing, and engaging regularly on the three things suggested above, we can pray the prayer in John 6.34, "…master, give us the bread, now and forever."

The good news is that the bread of life is FREE. All we have to do is BELIEVE, that Christ died in our place, He rose again from the dead, and He lived a life of perfect righteousness. Eat the bread of life, the bread of and from heaven, and be satisfied and overflow for others. **Amen**

THE LITURGY OF THE SACRAMENT

Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.

So, Father, we remember all that Jesus did, in him we plead with confidence his sacrifice made once for all upon the cross. Bringing before you the bread of life and cup of salvation, we proclaim his death and resurrection until he comes in glory.

Great is the mystery of faith: Christ has died Christ is risen Christ will come again.
